

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

NMOS is now accepting abstracts for presentation at the 59th Annual Meeting. Presentations for the NMOS General Science Session will be allotted 15 minutes, with an additional five-minute period for questions. Presentations may address topics ranging from technical reports of original research to more general presentations addressing science-related questions.

Please submit abstracts for the General Science Session in the format below:

- TITLE (in all capital letters) of no more than 20 words.
- Names and addresses of author(s) in the following form:

- Body of abstract as one single-spaced paragraph, not to exceed 250 words.
- Include E-mail address and/or phone number of presenting author.

Please email your abstract, including the entire abstract in the body of the email, **NOT** as an attachment. This will prevent any problems with incompatible word processing formats. The deadline for the submission of abstracts is **March 1, 2022**. Please email your abstract to Chuck Hayes <u>clhayes@unm.edu</u> AND to Matt Baumann <u>mbaumann22@gmail.com</u>.

All abstract submissions will be acknowledged within a week of receipt. If no acknowledgement is received, it is the submitter's responsibility to follow up with the Session Chair to ensure consideration. The abstracts for the NMOS General Science Session will be distributed at the meeting and will be published in the *NMOS Bulletin*.

NMOS RESEARCH GRANTS

NMOS offers two research grants each year to help support research on New Mexico birds. The **Ryan Beaulieu Research Grant**, for \$1000, is presented in memory of Ryan Beaulieu. Following the wishes of Ryan's family, this grant will support research projects that do not involve the collection of birds. For more information about Ryan Beaulieu and his bird research interests, see the Audubon magazine article, Band of Brothers, about Ryan and his friends Raymond VanBuskirk and Michael Hilchey and their Rosy-Finch project at <u>www.audubon.org/magazine/may-june-2010/band-brothers</u>. The **NMOS Research Grant** is also available for \$1000; both grants are open to all projects that meet these criteria:

- The grant money must be spent while conducting research on birds in New Mexico;
- The recipient must either present a paper based on the research at an annual NMOS Meeting or submit an article based on the research to the *NMOS Bulletin*; and
- Preference will be given to student applicants.

A short research proposal (2 pages maximum) must be submitted describing the nature of the project and how the allocated funds are to be spent (e.g., on gas, tape recording, specific equipment). Each proposal should state clearly whether the project does or does not involve collection of birds. Each proposal should include two letters of reference, one of which should be from a graduate advisor if the applicant is a graduate student. References should comment on the applicant's commitment to New Mexico ornithology and ability to design and carry out creative, independent research. All proposals will be evaluated together and up to two proposals will be awarded grants.

The deadline for 2022 Research Grant proposals is March 18, 2022. All applications will be acknowledged within a week of proposal receipt. If no acknowledgement is received, it is the applicant's responsibility to follow up with their submission to ensure consideration.

IN MEMORIAM: DALE A. ZIMMERMAN

Dale Allen Zimmerman passed away at his home in Silver City on 10 November 2021, aged 93, from complications following a stroke suffered earlier that month. Dale was an internationally respected ornithologist, bird artist, photographer, author, and editor who will be deeply missed in New Mexico and beyond.

Dale was born in Michigan in 1928 and, by the time he was in high school, was spending much of his time in the bird range of the University of Michigan's Museum of Zoology. He became a student at the university in 1946, earning B.S., M.S., and Ph.D. degrees by 1956; although his doctorate was

in botany, he maintained an office in the bird section of the museum, where he was mentored by George M. Sutton, among others, in ornithology and art. He met Marian Allen in botany classes, and they were married in 1950. During this time, he participated is several museum expeditions to Mexico, getting his first taste of tropical birds, including on a lengthy trip he and Marian undertook there in 1956.

Upon graduation, and desiring to be closer to Mexico, in 1957 Dale accepted a position of assistant professor of biological sciences at what is now Western New Mexico University and moved his family—Marian and their young son Allan—to Silver City. He became full professor in 1962, was chair of the Biology Department from 1965 to 1983, and was named emeritus professor upon retirement in 1988.

Expanding his horizons, Dale began field work in East Africa in the early 1960s, and that region became a major focus for the rest of his life. Nevertheless, over his career, he undertook field work on all continents. He was a member of many national and international scientific and conservation societies, and was an elected Fellow of the American Ornithological Society; he authored some 100 scientific publications, including many papers and notes on New Mexico birds. On the world stage, he was coauthor and major illustrator of *Birds of New Guinea* (Princeton, 1986) and the senior author and illustrator of the monumental *The Birds of Kenya and Northern Tanzania* (Princeton, 1996). More recently, he published *Turaco Country* (Sky Island Press, 2015), a memoir of his years

studying birds in East Africa, illustrated with over 900 of his photographs; he dedicated that work to his life partner Marian, whom he lost in 2011.

Closer to his New Mexico home, Dale was a founding member of the New Mexico Ornithological Society (NMOS) in 1962 and was a member of the society's original Board of Directors. He co-edited the first edition of the NMOS *New Mexico Bird Finding Guide* in 1984 and did the same for the second edition in 1992. When we organized the New Mexico Bird Records Committee in the early 1990s, Dale was an original member, serving from 1994 to 2008. He received the Florence Merriam Bailey Lifetime Achievement Award from NMOS in 2007. Throughout the years, Dale gave his art freely to the society, where it has complemented numerous society publications, and it adorns many NMOS T-shirts and coffee mugs to this day.

Dale was always generous with his time and knowledge. In the early 1970s, long before I ever met him, I wrote to him about my graduate project concerning Mexican Ducks (*Anas diazi*) in Mexico and asked if he had any information on the species there. Dale responded with a lengthy and detailed letter listing localities, dates, numbers, and habitat conditions, including mention of a tiny water hole in the middle of the Chihuahuan Desert, near the border between the states of Chihuahua and Durango and far from any rivers or lakes. He wrote that he and L. C. Binford had happened to stop there 23 May 1959, saw a Mexican Duck, and wondered if the site had potential. I managed to relocate that site 1 August 1976 and, sure enough, not only found a few Mexican Ducks but also a female with a brood of ducklings!


An exhibition of Dale's paintings and a memorial will be held in the spring of 2022 in Silver City; date and time to be announced.



New Mexico Bird Finding Guide Fourth Edition

This 4th Edition of the New Mexico Bird Finding Guide (Guide) provides an expanded and detailed overview of the best birding locations within each of the state's 33 counties, as well as an updated Annotated Checklist of Birds briefly describing the status and distribution of all birds that have been recorded in the state. As of this writing, 549 species of birds have been verified within New Mexico, ranking fourth among all the U.S. states behind California, Texas, and Arizona.

This Guide breaks down the state into seven regions containing three to eight physiographically similar counties. Each county chapter contains an Overview Map showing roads and major features, plus, for most counties, additional detailed maps of some of the major birding sites discussed in the chapter. The chapters



mention some species one can expect to find at each location (with an emphasis on those out-of-state visitors may find of interest), a subset of the rarities that have turned up, and additional specifics on where to find highly sought-after 'specialties' as appropriate.

The state has a number of popular birding sites frequented by state residents and outof-state birders alike, such as Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge and the Carlsbad Caverns area. Many parts of the state, however, are remote, difficult to access, and less well known ornithologically, with much yet to be learned at a time when species distributions and abundances are in considerable flux. Focusing on birds at a county level provides a convenient geographical reference for exploring the state's birdlife. It is hoped that the additional detail provided in this Guide may increase coverage by birders and continue to expand our knowledge of the avifauna statewide.
